#### **SPIRITUAL OBJECTIVES**

At the end of the sermon discussion, cell members will:

- 1. Reflect on the altar we have built in our lives and to enthrone God in our hearts
- 2. To commit our desires to Him for His glory.
- 3. To be reminded of His mercy, and how we are called to be set apart as living sacrifices

#### **SERMON SUMMARY**

The Israelites grew inpatient while waiting for Moses to return from his meeting with God with the Ten Commandments. Elder Ee Yang spoke about the problem of two altars. One was made by Moses with the

fundamental core belief that "We Belong to God" and He would lead them into the Promised Land. The second altar of the golden calf was made by the Israelites with the core belief of self-effort.

Elder Ee Yang also spoke about desires. Desires in itself is not wrong and they are put in our hearts by God to accomplish His purposes for us. However, any desire left unchecked, or not yet surrendered will ultimately lead to sin. Elder Ee Yang also spoke about three aspects of God's mercy 1) God withheld judgment, 2) God did not forsake His people and 3) extended it to cover all creation.

#### **SERMON RECAP**

God brought the Israelites out of Egypt and took them to Mount Sinai, where He revealed to them the fullness of His character and His plans for them to be to Him a kingdom of priests and a holy nation (Exodus 19:6).

Elder Ee Yang shared how there are privileges and responsibilities in this covenant between God and the Israelites. It is a privilege to be set apart for God. The Israelites needed to be mindful that they represented God in all areas and that they needed to pledge their total allegiance and commitment to God.

He also shared about how the Israelites struggled with the problem of two altars. They already had an altar that indicated that they belonged to God. They were consecrated by Moses (<u>Exodus 24:3</u>). God also provided Moses with the ten commandments – the laws on how to live a holy life set apart for God. However, they later grew impatient when Moses had not yet come down from the mountain and built another altar of the golden calf, which represents self-effort.

Desire was what prompted the making of the golden calf. Elder Ee Yang shared that there can be godly and ungodly desires. When these desires are pursued, they can lead to very different outcomes. Desires are put in our hearts by God to accomplish His purposes for us. It leads to holiness and righteousness.

However, any desire left unchecked, or not yet surrendered leads to sin. The Israelites had forgotten about the promise they made to God. They depended on their self-effort and engaged in sin (Exodus 32:6). It is a sobering reminder to be mindful of how we relate to God. Do we seek Him only for what we wish for, or do we seek His Kingdom and His righteousness?

The Israelites had to be held accountable for their sin of breaking their covenant with God. God had wanted to destroy them (<u>Exodus 32:9-10</u>). However, God in His mercy relented when Moses interceded on their behalf.

#### **Three Aspects of God's Mercy**

#### 1. Withholding Judgment (Exodus 32:11-14)

The Lord relented and withheld judgement from the Israelites due to Moses' intercession.

#### 2. Not Forsaking His People

God did not forsake His people through the journey. God had wanted to send an angel to go before the people and did not want to accompany them for concern that He would destroy them along the way as they were an obstinate people. Moses interceded on their behalf and God relented. (Exodus 33:1-3, Nehemiah 9:18-21).

Elder Ee Yang also shared about how God led the people with a pillar of cloud by day and the pillar of fire by night. God's leading is not functional. It is relational. It contains warmth. Clouds block the sun. Fire gives light and warmth. God provided for them with His tangible love.

#### 3. Covering all creation

God's mercy is not limited to the Israelites but to all creation (Exodus 34:6, Psalm 145:9).

#### **Conclusion**

In conclusion, God gave Israel a second chance and renewed His covenant with Israel (<u>Exodus 34:10-16</u>). The following are lessons that we can learn from today's message:

Desires are powerful. If our desires go unchecked, it will surely lead to sin

- The Israelites' departed from God's altar and built their own altar of desire.
- As a result, they fell into idolatry. They broke their covenant with God
- Because of God's mercy, He withheld judgment against them. He continued to lead them with tender mercies. He renewed His covenant with them

Elder Ee Yang encouraged us to reflect what altar we are building and to offer our bodies as living sacrifices (<u>Romans 12:1</u>). He encouraged RiverLifers to approach God's altar with our desires and to align it to His desires. As we align our desires to God, we become ready to receive His promises and become a conduit for the Word of God to become flesh.

#### **DISCUSSION QUESTIONS**

- 1. Elder Ee Yang spoke about the Israelites having two altars. What did the different altars represent? What kind of altar are you building in your life today? In this present day and age, we are called to be living sacrifices. What does it look like? [10 Mins]
- 2. Elder Ee Yang spoke about desires how it can be put in our hearts by God to accomplish His purposes; but how it could also lead to sin if left unchecked or not surrendered to Him. How can we identify if carrying out our desires are done out of the right posture? What are the measures or checkpoints we can put in our lives to empower us to bravely pursue what God has placed in our hearts while ensuring that we do not fall into sin? [10 Mins]
- 3. We see God's mercy displayed in His dealings with the Israelites. We are reconciled back to God because Jesus took on the punishment for our sins. God remains faithful to us even when we are faithless, and He forgives when we return to Him with a repentant heart. Take some time to reflect on God's mercy to the Israelites and to us. Then, share with one another one step you would like to take in your everyday life in response to God's mercy. [15 Mins]



Consider dividing the group into micro-groups for a deeper time of sharing as well as praying for the following items:

#### 1. Sermon Application

- We will be reminded that God loves us dearly and has established a covenant with us
- For God to let our hearts be sensitive to the Holy Spirit's leading, to be convicted when we may intentionally or unintentionally put ourselves, others or other things as counterfeit Gods instead of God.
- To commit our desires to Him. To seek first His kingdom and His righteousness and seek His timing and will for the desires He has placed in our hearts.
- For His wisdom and strength to live our lives as living sacrifices
- Thank God for how He is both a God of mercy and justice, and how we are recipients of His mercy through the sacrifice of Jesus.

#### 2. COVID-19 in Singapore

• Singapore is currently in Phase 2. Pray for the community cases to go down with time.

- Pray for the government and relevant authorities to have wisdom and strength as they continue to manage the situation
- Pray for the health of those who have recovered or are recovering from Covid-19.
- Continued progress in Singapore to overcome the negative economic and social impact of the current crisis.
- Pray that God's peace upon the land. Pray for those who may be feeling anxious and fearful, to find an anchor in God's sovereignty and love.

#### 3. COVID-19 in South Asia

- Swift end to the COVID-19 crisis in the world, especially in India and the rest of South Asia.
- Healing and comfort for those who are sick and suffering.
- Protection and guidance for the healthcare professionals who are at the frontline, giving them wisdom, courage and strength to confront this crisis.
