



31 JUL 2022 | PASTOR ERNIE SONG WORSHIPPING IN WHOLENNESS | 2 CHRONICLES 6-7

SPIRITUAL OBJECTIVES

At the end of the sermon discussion, cell members will:

- 1. Understand that worship begins with restoration wholeness.
- 2. Recognise that wholeness can only be found in the place of surrendering of our rights.
- 3. Know that when we surrender, our places of restoration will be where God's presence and glory is manifested through us to the world.

SERMON SUMMARY

In <u>2 Chronicles 6-7</u>, Solomon built a temple for God on the threshing floor of Araunah, which is the place of David and Israel's restoration. When the temple was built, Solomon offered a lavish sacrifice unto the Lord and interceded on behalf of the people of Israel. God then accepted the sacrifice by consuming the burnt offering as an act of worship to Him. The place of restoration (threshing floor of Araunah) became the place of God's presence and glory.

In the New Testament, we are the temple and living sacrifice. God desires that our sacrifices (worship) to Him come from a place of wholeness. Hence, it is His desire that we seek wholeness (restoration) in our bodies (strength), souls (emotions) and hearts (minds). When we surrender areas of our lives that are "un-whole" to God, He will be pleased and will bring healing and restoration. Then, God's presence and glory can be manifested in us to the world.

SERMON RECAP

PART 1: THE SIGNIFICANCE OF SOLOMON'S TEMPLE

1. Solomon built the temple lavishly (2 Chronicles 3-4):

- The temple was meant for men to commune with the Lord (through the offering of sacrifice and prayers) and for God to dwell among men (<u>Exodus 29:45-46</u>).
- It is to teach Israel that God is holy. It can therefore be dangerous to recklessly approach
 God for we are sinful. We must approach Him by His rules and His ways.
- o In the Old Testament, the living sacrifices offered to the Lord must be whole clean, unblemished and without flaws (Leviticus 1-27).
- o The sacrifice that God accepts as worship on the altar is one that is whole.

2. Solomon prayed as he dedicated the temple (6:14-42):

- o Solomon recalled God's covenantal faithfulness to David (2 Chronicles 6:14-17).
- o Solomon pleaded on behalf of the people of Israel (2 Chronicles 6:22-39).



3. Solomon prayed for God to manifest His presence in a special way:

Prayers offered at the temple (2 Chronicles 6:41).

4. After the prayer, God consumed the offered sacrifices that were lavishly given:

• 22,000 Oxen and 120,000 Sheep – all unblemished (<u>2 Chronicles 7:5</u>)

<u>Significance of the temple</u>: The threshing floor of Araunah (Ornan), the place of brokenness and restoration, became the place of God's presence and glory.

PART 2: THE NEW COVENANT CONTEXT

Christ's work on the cross was sufficient to fulfil all the ceremonial laws of Moses:

- Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is sufficient (Hebrews 10:11-14).
- We need not go back to how the Israelites worship (e.g. sacrificing animals).

2. The implication of Christ's work on the cross:

- In the New Testament, there is no more physical altar or temple.
- We are now the temple of the Holy Spirit (<u>1 Corinthians 6:19-20</u>, <u>Romans 12:1-2</u>).
- Our bodies become the living sacrifice.

3. The implication of God's requirement of sacrifice:

- In the Old Testament, God requires that the sacrifice on the altar be whole.
- Likewise, our living sacrifice that we offer to the Lord must be whole.

<u>Key Point</u>: If we desire to see God's glory to manifest in us as living sacrifices to the world, we must seek wholeness.

PART 3: IMPLICATIONS FOR US

1. To offer worship that is acceptable unto the Lord, we need to pursue wholeness.

- Allow God to be involved in every part of our days, not only during the times when we are doing our devotions.
- Surrendering our wills, emotions and how we should take care of ourselves is an act of worship to God.
- The foundation of acceptable worship is wholeness.

2. People Are Un-Whole Because of Untreated Wounds.

- Wounds that are left untreated leads to un-wholeness.
- God's glory cannot be fully displayed or present on a sacrifice that is unwhole.
- God desires that we become a living sacrifice that is whole.

3. Acceptable worship requires the sacrifice to be whole.

- To be whole, we need to surrender our rights.
- When we come to a place of surrender, our worship to the Lord will come from a place of wholeness.



- The altar in the Old Testament is built by the layering of rocks that have been broken through seismic activity. Similarly, if we are to build our altars, we need to bring the broken pieces of our lives (that were caused by seismic events) before the Lord.
- Therefore, we can choose to drag these "rocks" that we have in our lives and be burdened by them, or take these broken parts of our lives and arrange them before the Lord as our altars for our sacrifices (Psalm 51:17).
- If we build this altar of worship through the surrendering of our rights and our un-wholeness, and offer up ourselves once again to the Lord, God will come and consume our sacrifice. His glory will be manifested through us to the world.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. In the New Testament, there is no more physical temple. We are now the temple of the Holy Spirit and our bodies become the living sacrifice. Read Romans 12:1-2. What do these verses say about wholeness? What prevents us from pursuing wholeness? [10 min]

Leader's Notes

This is a recap and reflect question for members to ponder on how the temple that Solomon built in the Old Testament relates to us today. We are now living in the New Testament era where Christ's work on the cross is sufficient to fulfil all the ceremonial laws of Moses in the Old Testament era (Hebrews 10:11-14). Leaders can explain and reiterate the point in the sermon that there are no more physical temples as our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 6:19-20). In the Old Testament era, God requires that the sacrifice on the altar be whole. Similarly, the sacrifice we offer to God now must be whole. Members can share what they think wholeness is based on the Word of God. They can also share some ways in which they feel are preventing them from pursuing wholeness that God desires in their lives. Leaders can encourage members to continue to go to God with their brokenness in pursuit of God's presence and glory.

Transition

As we go to God with our brokenness and seek after His presence and glory, let us evaluate our lives in the measure of wholeness based on the Word of God.

2. Ps Ernie exhorted us to live our lives worthy of how Jesus had purchased for us on the cross. There is more to this life just than what we see physically. How can we get to the place of wholeness that God intends for each of us? [15 min]

Leader's Notes

This is a reflect and response question for members to share about how they can apply what they have learnt from the sermon about achieving greater wholeness in their lives. Members can share if they are already living a life of wholeness. Members can also share if they feel that they are far from being whole and to give personal experiences or examples. Leaders can encourage members to allow God to be involved not only when we are doing our devotion but in every aspect of our lives throughout the day. Leaders can also encourage members to surrender our will and emotions to Him as our worship unto God.



Transition

As we desire to move towards the place of wholeness, let us consider areas of our lives that we have wounds that have been left untreated.

3. Are there areas (e.g. wounds, disappointments, hurts, etc.) in our lives that we struggle to surrender to God? [15 min]

Leader's Notes

This is a reflect and response question for members to identify wounds in their lives that are untreated and that they find difficult to surrender to God. Leaders can encourage members to live a life of sacrifice unto the Lord through surrendering every aspect of our lives to Him and to worship Him in wholeness. As sharing by members can be very personal, leaders can break the cell into smaller groups of 2 to 4 for a more intimate time of sharing and upholding each other in prayer.

Closing

As we approach the last sermon of this series — Rebuilding the Altar, let us remember that God's desire is for us to be a living sacrifice that is whole. In order to do so, we need to surrender our brokenness to God at the altar and God will do His work of restoration in our lives. Through His work of restoration, God's glory and presence will be manifested in and through our lives.

WORKS

Consider dividing the group into micro-groups for a deeper time of sharing as well as praying for the following items:

1. Sermon Application

- Our worship would begin with restoration and a commitment to seek wholeness.
- We surrender our brokenness to God at the altar and be restored by God in His time to wholeness in Christ. May our lives be living testimonies of God's glory and presence!

2. COVID-19 in Singapore

- Pray for God's protection especially from the Omicron variant.
- Pray that the community cases will be low.

3. World

- A swift end to the COVID-19 crisis globally, if not a reduction in cases in third world nations, and a stable environment where humans and virus coexist.
- Pray for peace especially in areas of conflict (Ukraine) and potential conflict
 China & Taiwan.

4. Opportunities for Outreach

 Ask the Lord to grant you opportunities to reach out to a non-believing loved one, friend, or colleague this week as we seek to mature in Christlikeness.
